#### **Paul's Ponderings**

While we were at SQL Connections last week we taught a pre-con workshop on the fundamentals of a health SQL Server database. It goes into good practices about database configuration and maintenance, and it's aimed at the wide variety of IT professionals who may end up supporting a SQL Server instance (i.e. not just true SQL Server DBAs).

We've been teaching a workshop like this for at least 5 years, and as Kimberly was teaching one of her sections, I started thinking about how often I make changes to the slides to make sure they're reflecting the most up-to-date operational practices. It's really surprising how frequently some facet of operational practices has to change, or is it?

If you think about all of the factors that need to be considered when deciding just what your operational practices should be then there's a huge number of things, including:

- Server hardware (e.g. CPU configuration, memory configuration)
- I/O subsystem hardware (e.g. the rise of SSDs)
- Windows technology (e.g. much faster SMB shares now)
- SQL Server technology (e.g. Availability Groups in SQL Server 2012)
- SQL Server licensing (e.g. the 2012 changes)
- Application requirements
- Performance requirements
- Security requirements
- Data volumes
- Connection volumes
- Business RTO and RPO requirements
- Globalization

The list is practically endless. There's no one-size-fits-all answer to how to configure and control your SQL Server, which is why there are so many different configurations out there, and why we have such fun teaching and consulting – we're always learning new configurations and tweaks to best practices.

One thing that I do find quite common though is that many companies don't re-evaluate their operational practices to take account of the many changes that occur over time (from the list above). This can lead to them falling behind the curve with respect to best practices for the healthiest systems.

For instance, it's especially important to regularly re-evaluate HA/DR strategy to make sure that the DR provisions will still result in a successful recovery within the proscribed RTO and RPO limits. What if your databases are larger so restoring them now takes longer than your RTO limit?

With all the possible changes that could occur in your environment, when was the last time \*you\* re-evaluated any of your strategies and practices?

**Call to action**: Take some time to reflect on how the factors governing how you provision, manage, and maintain your SQL Server instances and databases may have changed over the last few years and decide whether those changes merit some rethinking about your operational practices. It may be time for some changes.
