Paul's Ponderings

In this week's newsletter, I want to let you know that sometimes I think you have to be willing to take a risk to get to a better place in life, especially in your career. Let me tell you a story...

Five years ago I left Microsoft, on August 31st, 2007, just over a month after marrying Kimberly. Leaving Microsoft after almost 9 nine years was a hard decision to make because I really enjoyed working there, and really liked managing teams, but it wasn't allowing me to get closer to my life goals. I'd learned a huge amount since leaving DEC to join Microsoft, not least how to manage people and teams effectively and compassionately.

But my life at Microsoft was lacking. I'd realized that there were some things I wanted from my job that indicated I might have to leave Microsoft and join Kimberly:

- My career passion had become presenting. Conferences, classes, consulting I loved it. I also loved (and still love) SQL Server and helping people with it, so doing full-time training, consulting and conferences purely on SQL Server would be the perfect job.
- Kimberly and I wanted to work together. We'd done a lot of co-presenting at conferences and found we work incredibly well together. What better way to spend more time with each other than to run her company together, do all our worldwide consulting/training work together, build new areas of the business, expand in new locales, and so on.
- My other life's passions are my two girls (7 and almost 6, back in 2007). I'd missed a lot of things with them over the last few years leading up to shipping SQL Server 2005 and it became of over-riding importance to me that I get to spend more time with them and be available for school trips, etc. during the regular work day. We were really concerned about the possibility of failure, but being able to go back to Microsoft was always a possibility. Thankfully that wasn't required, and hopefully won't be in future either!

And then on September 3rd, I had my first day as a small-business owner, joining Kimberly running SQLskills.com. And you know the rest of the story; otherwise you wouldn't be reading this newsletter. I took the risk and ended up in a better place.

Call to action: Think about where you are in your career, what your life goals are, and whether you're going to be able to work towards them in the job you currently have.
