It's the time of year when many people make New Year's resolutions (I have a recurring one to exercise more and eat less ©), but how many of you reading this made a SQL Server-related resolution?

I made two: to do more public speaking, and to learn something new and out of my comfort zone about SQL Server. Let me explain...

You might think the first resolution doesn't make much sense, as I spend a lot of time teaching classes (83 days in 2012), but that's all classes and conferences. What I'm talking about is doing more user group presentations, and mostly remotely.

If you're interested in public speaking about SQL Server, there are quite a few options open to you:

- Conferences like PASS, TechEd, and our new conference SQLIntersection (more details in the next newsletter but save the date for the week of April 8, 2013)
- SQL Saturdays: there's usually one happening somewhere in the world every weekend
- User groups: there are hundreds of SQL Server user groups, but don't stop just there .Net, SharePoint, and developer user groups are also great places to speak about SQL Server
- Within your own company: presenting to your colleagues is a great way to practice giving presentations and can also be a great way to foster relations between different I.T. teams within your organization

For the second resolution, I haven't finalized what I'm going to learn about yet, but I'm leaning towards PowerShell, which I haven't played with at all yet. Like many of you, I don't have time to sit down and spend a day or two doing nothing but learning a new area, but I do have time to absorb things in small chunks (which is what I'm continually doing through the year).

So, if you want to learn something new, where would you start? One of the easiest ways to learn is to read through one of the month-long Topic-A-Day blog post series that people have written recently. Here are some examples:
