Paul's Ponderings

To start with, I have a quick correction from last week's newsletter. When describing the locks required for offline rebuilding of indexes, I mistakenly told you the locks for offline *building*, not rebuilding. Offline rebuilding of an index requires a SCH_M lock on the table for the duration. Sorry for any confusion.

In my *Practical Disaster Recovery Techniques* pre-con workshop I did at PASS last week and will be doing at SQLintersection on Friday, one of the things I stressed was that practicing disaster recovery (DR) techniques is crucial for success when a disaster happens for real.

In this newsletter, I want to pose a series of questions to you and make you think about an honest answer to each one. I'm sure some of you practice DR techniques regularly, but from surveying classes I know that those of you who do are not in the majority.

Part 1: Information

- Do you know where the latest copy of the DR handbook/run book is? Does everyone else know?
- Do you know where the scripts are for automating restores of your backups?
- Do you know where the installation media for Windows and SQL Server are kept in your environment?
- Do you know where the Windows and SQL Server product keys are?
- Do you know how you'll be able to get new servers if your data center is destroyed?
- And do you know where they will be installed? What about network? Power? HVAC?

Part 2: Techniques

- When was the last time you tried a full restore sequence, including tail-of-the-log backups?
- When was the last time you tried failing over to your secondary servers/data center?
- When was the last time you did a bare-metal install? How long did it take?
- When was the last time you rebuilt or restored master on a server?
- When was the last time you practiced a recovery as if your main server was completely dead? Did you successfully recover?
- When was the last time you practiced a recovery as if your main SAN was completely dead? Did you successfully recover?
- When was the last time you practiced a recovery as if you didn't have onsite backups and the SAN was dead? Did you successfully recover?

Call to action: Think through the answers to the questions above and consider whether you're comfortable with your responses. Now, think whether you'd be comfortable if someone responsible for some of your data (e.g. your bank, 401-k/retirement account holder, doctor's

office, favorite airline, credit-card companies) made those same answers about their DR preparedness. My feeling is that you should be able to answer 'yes' for all the Part 1 questions, and answer 'within the last 3 months' for all the Part 2 questions, to feel fully comfortable that you're practicing enough.

I'm curious to hear your thoughts on practicing DR techniques, so please feel free to drop me a line, always treated confidentially, of course.
