He was the father of the much more famous William Marshall, who was Marshall for King Henry II and an intimate of Eleanor of Aquitaine. I've read so much about this era so it was a treat to have one of the somewhat side characters given an excellent novel to himself. Highly recommended for fans of historical fiction.

Paul's Ponderings

I'm writing this while still at SQLintersection and I've just finished presenting a new DBA Mythbusters session. I love doing sessions like this as I get to jump around all over the SQL Server Engine and talk about lots of different things.

One of the myths I busted in the session is "Always plan a backup strategy".

Now don't get me wrong, you do need to have a backup strategy, but you shouldn't start out by thinking about what you backup strategy is going to be.

Let me tell you a story.

Back while I was on the SQL Server development team at Microsoft, I happened to be on site with Product Support, when they took a call from a small bank with corruption problems. At first they were reluctant to discuss their backups, but once we showed how recovering without backups would mean data loss, they explained their situation.

They had a full database backup from the start of January, were using the full recovery mode, and had log backups from every half-hour. The problem was that we were then in late April – so more than 5,000 backups.

And they were all on tape!

We were very skeptical that the restore sequence would work without a problem but, miracle of miracles, it did. However, it took *three* days.

They'd called in on Tuesday and the restore sequence finished on Friday. For those three days, the entire bank was offline. No ATMs, no payments, no bill paying, and so on.

And they went out of business.

If your bank is unexpectedly down for, say, half a day, you're unlikely to go through all the hassle of changing to a different bank. But if your bank is down for three days, now you won't trust them and you'll take your business somewhere else.

They thought they had a great backup strategy: full recovery mode and regular log backups. But they'd never tried doing a restore so didn't realize it would take so long.

Call to action: The trick is to plan a *restore* strategy. Think about what restores you need to be able to do to meet your downtime and data loss service level agreements. That then dictates what backups you need to have so that you can do those restores. If you just think about things from a backup strategy point of view, you can get into trouble.
