Book Review

From the archives (and I just recommended this to my Dad over the weekend): Back in 2014 I read Eric Schlosser's *Command and Control: Nuclear Weapons, the Damascus Accident, and the Illusion of Safety*. This is an absolutely excellent history of US nuclear weapon control (or lack of it), accidents involving US nuclear weapons, and US nuclear strategy from the 40s to the 80s. It's really shocking how close the US came to an accidental nuclear detonation several times. it also covers the Damascus accident in great detail, along with the almost laughable ineptitude of the Air Force and SAC in dealing with it. There are very comprehensive notes and sources, which actually led me to buy another 15 or so books over the following two weeks on related topics. Highly recommended!
