If you've followed my blog and/or Twitter account for a few years, you'll know that one of my hot buttons is people being insensitive or rude online - in email, Twitter, blog comments, whatever.

A loose acquaintance posted something like 'Time to make haggis!' maybe thinking they were being funny. But not to me, who really likes sheep, and had obviously posted the story because it was upsetting to me.

Along these lines, Jonathan noticed a blog post during the week and sent the link to our team. We discussed it amongst ourselves and agreed that it would be a good topic for the newsletter this time.

The blog post is from Jeff Atwood (<u>@CodingHorror</u>), who founded <u>Stack Exchange</u>, and is about empathy and the effect that typed words can have on others.

Kimberly and I feel that empathy seems to have been replaced by an unnecessary need to reduce response time. Fueled also by (the often anonymity of) the internet, people are too quick to react without any real thought about what the event / story / news item / tweet, etc. means to the person that posted it.

Too often people want to be the FIRST! commenter or the most clever commenter or the most snarky commenter – as opposed to a compassionate commenter. In *many* recent interactions, this is especially true. People have lost sight of how we got to where we are and aren't stopping to think about what their actions mean to others; ultimately, damaging relationships that took much longer to form.
