## Ponderings...

We've all heard about ransomware attacks and the havoc it can wreak on the organization that gets hit. For example:

- In 2023, the British Library website was hit and remained down for months. After refusing to pay the ransom, they used an estimated 40% of their financial reserves (\$6-7 million) to recover. (Wikipedia source)
- In 2021, Colonial Pipeline was hit which caused gas shortages and led to state of emergency being declared in 17 states and Washington, D.C. Even though they paid the \$4.4 million ransom, the recovery tool provided took a very long time to complete. (Wikipedia source)

There are many more documented cases, and likely a \*lot\* more undocumented cases. According to the 2023 FBI Internet Crime Report, there was a 15% increase in ransomware cases reported to the FBI from 2022 to 2023. Both the cases I cited above where deemed as entirely preventable if proper security practices had been followed.

This year we've helped two clients recover from devastating ransomware attacks (one was made public, the other not). In each case, Jonathan spent around 40 hours helping coordinate and implement SQL Server recovery, one involving working through the night.

If your organization gets hit, as a SQL Server professional, your focus is going to be on bringing your servers and databases online with the minimal amount of data loss and downtime. But there are many potential snags along the way, such as:

• Who has authority to make decisions on how to move forward?

- Do you have redundant copies of things like encryption keys and account passwords? And are they stored on an air-gapped system that wouldn't be compromised if your entire network was?
- How long does it take for your backups to restore? And what if the VM or physical servers were wiped?
- Can you even start rebuilding if a service like Active Directory isn't there?

It's a long list of considerations. Unfortunately, we find over and over that many companies aren't very prepared for a disaster of any kind. Performance is king – which we see when we teach classes and performance tuning classes sell out but our HA/DR class is often only half full.

**Call to action:** Be concerned about ransomware and other cyber-attacks. You absolutely need to be prepared for a disaster because it's not just physical disasters that can hit your organization. We're here to help you prepare, analyze your current plans, and recover if you get hit. Drop us a <u>line!</u>
